Message from the Parish priest:

We often think of peace as the absence of trouble—a calm day, a conflict-free life, a smooth path. But the peace that Jesus offers is something deeper, stronger, and more enduring than mere quietness. It is not about avoiding discomfort, but about being rooted in the presence and will of God.

Jesus did not come to make us comfortable—He came to make us whole. His peace is not a cushion but a call. He says, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give as the world gives" (John 14:27). The world gives

peace that depends on circumstances. Christ gives peace that survives even in the midst of storms.

Sometimes, the Lord unsettles us—not to harm us, but to wake us up. He disturbs our comfort zones to draw us closer to Him. Like a shepherd who prods the sheep onward, the Lord challenges us to grow, to let go of false securities, and to seek what is real and lasting.

In Scripture, we see that the people who truly encountered God—Moses, Mary, the Apostles—were often called out of quiet situations and into something greater, something harder, but far more meaningful. Peace did not mean ease; it meant

being in right relationship with God, no matter the cost.

As disciples, we are not called to settle for shallow comfort, but to seek the peace that flows from living in truth, justice, and faith. This means facing hard questions, letting go of selfish desires, and being open to God's transformation in our lives.

Let us ask ourselves: Are we seeking a life of ease, or a life of meaning? Are we asking the Lord to keep us comfortable, or to make us holy?

May we have the courage to be seekers of true peace—not just a quiet life, but a life alive in Christ.

You bore me to be a man of strife for the whole world.

The king's leading men spoke to the king. 'Let Jeremiah be put to death: he is unquestionably disheartening the remaining soldiers in the city, and all the people too, by talking like this. The fellow does not have the welfare of this people at heart so much as its ruin.' 'He is in your hands as you know,' King Zedekiah answered 'for the king is powerless against you.' So they took Jeremiah and threw him into the well of Prince Malchiah in the Court of the Guard, letting him down with ropes. There was no water in the well, only mud, and into the mud My sheep listen to my voice, says the Jeremiah sank.

Ebed-melech came out from the palace I know them, and they follow me. and spoke to the king. 'My lord king,' he Alleluia! said, 'these men have done a wicked thing by treating the prophet Jeremiah like this: they have thrown him into the well where |I| have come not to give peace, but he will die.' At this the king gave Ebed-melech the Cushite the following order: 'Take three men with you from here and pull the prophet Jeremiah out of the well before he dies.'

REFLECTION FOR YOUNG PEOPLE by Lisa-Marie Calderone-Stewart

Jeremiah is stuck in the mud at the bottom of a well. He was thrown in there because he said that God wanted Jerusalem to surrender to Babylon in order to save their own lives - a message the people did not want to hear. He was a prophet who was being punished for speaking the truth. People don't like to hear what they don't want to do - they would rather blame the speaker and pretend the message is wrong than listen to the truth.

Modern-day prophets likewise try to warn people about what will happen if we don't change. Books, movies and television documentaries try to warn us about things like population growth, pollution levels, unhealthy ingredients in foods, the waste of natural resources, the ruin of rainforests, corruption in government or industry, and so forth.

Which modern-day prophets do you listen to? Which ones do you want to ignore? Whv?

Although Jeremiah is stuck at the bottom of the muddy well, he is not completely abandoned. He has a few loyal supporters to help him get out. The Scripture verses that follow the readings for this Sunday explain how Ebed-melech got some rags from the palace linen closet and lowered them into the well with the ropes. He told Jeremiah to put the rags under his armpits so the ropes would not cut and burn him. Ebed-melech was obviously kind and courageous.

Do you have such a loyal friend who might help you out if you were unjustly punished? Has such a thing ever happened to vou? What was the outcome?

We never hear a word about Jeremiah's words or feelings or thoughts. He is silent throughout this whole ordeal. What do you think he felt or thought or said? What do you think he did in that well? Do you think he prayed or cried or screamed out loud? What would you do?

Gospel Reflection

This week's short and sharp gospel brings to mind two popular sayings (sometimes regarded as blessings, and sometimes regarded as curses). The first is fictitiously ascribed as an ancient Chinese saying, 'May you live in interesting times!' The inference of the blessing/curse is that 'interesting times' equate to disturbing, tumultuous times or times of rapid change. Some people thrive on such change and upheaval, while others dread the thought of change.

The second blessing/curse is, 'May the peace of Christ disturb response? you!' It occasionally turns up around Christmas or Easter and is sometimes provocatively used by those who advocate for justice and peace. The saying cuts to the heart of what Jesus says in today's gospel: the message he brings is not a cosy, complacent peace, but rather a message that confronts and challenges, even turning loved ones against each other.

Jesus reminds us that if we take on his message of compassion, Q. What issue in your local community needs to be challenged hospitality and table fellowship then it can set us apart from those who have not accepted the message - even family members. It's a challenging message that even love and loyalty within a family can be disrupted by seeking to authentically live the model of Jesus. If we authentically place the needs of the lowly and the outcast ahead of our own and ahead of our family, then this can be very confronting and very disrupting. What are the consequences for family gatherings? What might the gathering at Christmas dinner look like if we take this message seriously? Jesus says that the normal obligations to family have to take second place to acting on his message and bringing about the kingdom of God.

Living the Gospel – Speaking a hard message

Today's gospel reminds us that the message of Christianity is not always a popular one. Sometimes we are called upon to speak a hard message; a challenging message; a confronting message. The message of the gospel frequently confronts our popular culture and accepted social practice. It often contradicts the expedient decisions of our political leaders. There is a responsibility on us to speak the hard message of the gospel even at the risk of unpopularity and even in the face of threat. The Christian heroes of our time are those who call leaders to measure up to the demands of the gospel.

Scriptural context – Turning point

As we've seen over the last few weeks, chapter 12 of the gospel of Luke presents a collection of sayings by Jesus exhorting his followers to take up his message fearlessly and assuring them that if they do so then God will protect them - even in the hardest of times. The chapter captures what must have been a period of frustration for Jesus in his ministry: he has been preaching and performing miracles, yet his followers don't seem to understand his purpose. The chapter has an urgency and a sharpness of tone that reflect the frustration of Jesus at this mid -point in the gospel.

Historical Context – Family ties

In the ancient world, and particularly in Jewish culture, family meant everything. One's identity was completely tied up with family. Families absolutely depended on one another for survival and for personal identity. Young men were identified by who their father was. Women quite literally 'belonged' to their father or husband. The entire fabric of society and tradition was held together by extended families. For Jesus to say that his message would tear families apart was to say that all of society would be transformed by the message. The kingdom of God turns

expectations and society on their head, breathing new life into tired, restrictive structures.

Questions for Adolescents

- Q. What was your immediate reaction to the gospel message that Jesus came to bring division?
- Q. In what ways can family loyalty get in the way of living the way Jesus called us to live?
- Q. When have you ever held back from doing or saying the Christian thing for fear of rejection?
- Q. What area of your life is calling you to a more active Christian

Questions for Adults

- Q. How might the message of Jesus bring about division?
- Q. When have you experienced division or rejection as a result of the Christian message?
- Q. Who do you know in your local community who speaks up for Christian values without counting the cost?
- on Christian principles?

Learning moments

In his message on the World Day of Peace in 1972, Pope Paul VI famously quoted, 'If you want peace, work for justice'. Explore the work of groups whose fight for peace is grounded in justice and sometimes challenges social and political structures (e.g. Pax Christi, Catholic Worker Movement, Ploughshares, Wellspring Community).

Design a poster and slogan that conveys the essential message of today's gospel.

Use prayerful reflection or mediation to recall an occasion when you had the opportunity to speak a hard Christian message but refrained from doing so. Replay the incident and consider alternative responses.

REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSA

As disciples we commit ourselves to values and principles that are not always cherished by others. We can be misunderstood for our beliefs, even ridiculed. Our lives may be a reproach to those who do not share our aspirations. There may be times when we must stand in opposition to others. All of this tends to alienate us. It could even place us at enmity with those whom we love. Yet, if we are genuinely committed, we realise that there is also a price to pay if we are not faithful. It is very difficult to live with ourselves when we disregard our deepest convictions and ignore the promptings of God that we experience within ourselves. As difficult as a life of faith may be, we know that it is the only way to live in this world.

Faced with the cost of discipleship we are brought to the realisation that, by ourselves, we do not have the necessary resources. We need assistance. Like Jeremiah, we might find that this aid will come from places we may have never expected. The real support and assistance that we get is from Jesus who came to set the world and our hearts on fire. Paul assures us that there is a vast throng cheering us on as we run the race of discipleship. They are not merely spectators; they have already run or are still running their own race. We are not alone in our commitment, in our struggle. There are many witnesses, many examples for us to follow.



SAFEGUARDING

As part of the Diocese of Parramatta's commitment to ensuring all children and adults at risk are safe, respected, protected and supported in our care, all staff and volunteers in our parishes, chaplaincies, agencies, ministries and councils are required to complete Mandatory Safeguarding.

All staff and volunteers are required to undertake safeguarding training and must complete three mandatory modules which total six points.

Module 2: Legal Compliance, ROSH (Risk Of Significant Harm) and RC (Reportable Conduct)

Module 3: Working with Adults at Risk and Understanding Boundaries

Cycle 2 (Renewal Training for staff/volunteers who completed Cycle 1 two years ago) Module 4: Applying the Child Safe Standards to Safeguard Children & Adults at Risk Module 5: Legal Compliance: Risk of Significant Harm (ROSH) and Reportable Conduct
